Council-Manager Briefing

Village Green

Mayor Rhodus called the briefing to order at 6:30 PM. Councilmembers present: Leslie Besl, Dale Paullus, Terry Senger, Adam Kraft, Tim Meyers and Gwen Brill.

City Manager Timmer and Acting Parks & Recreation Director Brock presented the plan for the Village Green Playground Project. See attached slides.

Business Meeting Call to Order

Mayor Rhodus called the Regular Meeting of Council to order at 7:00 PM.

Councilmember Besl, seconded by Vice Mayor Meyers, moved for Executive Session to discuss the status of negotiations with public employees regarding their wages, hours and other terms and conditions of their employment, as well as pending or imminent litigation. Roll call vote. Motion carried 6-0.

Citizen Comments

1. Dick Bell, 370 Hallmark Court

Mr. Bell stated that his property backs up to public property and the public property is a common thoroughfare for the coyotes and then they enter residents' yards. He stated that he reviewed the plans on the website and there is no balance, but all of the responsibility is on the residents.

2. Mike Baynes, 1792 Gloster

Mr. Baynes stated that he installed flood lights, motion sensors, cameras, etc. and has recorded coyotes in his yard several times. He stated that there was a dog killed by a coyote on Mack Road after the last meeting. He said he has called a lot of professionals and most won't trap coyotes and those that will want \$1,000 for up front costs plus another \$500 if a coyote is caught. He said that the feral cat problem is a food source to the coyotes and that he doesn't care about opposing views because these are not bunnies and they have no predators.

3. Bob Erbs, 621 Glenna

Mr. Erbs stated that he has lost 5 pets in 3 months due to coyotes. He said Animal Control was unsympathetic and told him it was just nature. He said he found a coyote in his yard, shaking a cat house and when it saw him, it jumped a 6 foot privacy fence without an issue. He said the Donut Spot employees regularly see coyotes in packs on the sidewalk when they go in to work during the night.

4. Liz Jarvis, 2440 Clara Bea

Mrs. Jarvis stated that she has learned a lot over the last few weeks and understands that all coyotes shouldn't be killed. She sees the progression according to the interaction chart, though, and feels there are some that are a problem in the city. She would like to see more removal of the dens, especially on public property. She said there are coyote dens in Oakwood Park and on the golf courses. She would like to see the City work to get all residents on board and send postcards out for training sessions regarding coyote hazing and interactions. She would also like the City to keep track of hot spots. She stated that she is purchasing a motion sensor with ultrasonic sound to try to deter them and will report if it works.

5. Ricky Riley, 5552 Crystal Drive

Mr. Riley stated that the plan is just a legal exercise to avoid liability and there will not be any success with it. He stated that the plan makes Fairfield a coyote sanctuary city because they will learn where they are safe from hunting. He said the City should track sighting and exterminate them in parks at night. He said the plan does not include finding and destroying the dens. He said there is too much land in Fairfield for one Animal Control Officer to police. He stated that someone will take the City to court if the plan is adopted as is.

6. Mark Jarvis, 2440 Clara Bea

Mr. Jarvis stated that coyotes will see the traps and avoid those areas, which doesn't solve the problem, it only moves it. He stated that the problem is on public property because that is where the dens and breeding grounds are. He said the City is accountable and needs to be responsible to keep the City safe.

7. Tina Kozeniac, 5284 Winton Road

Ms. Kozeniac stated that she encountered a coyote across from the middle school at 2:30 PM on the property she manages. She said it did not back down from her and her vehicle. She asked if she would be charged with a crime for destroying a coyote in self defense on her own property or on the property she manages? Mr. Wolterman told her that the city has never prosecuted for self defense. She stated that the City needs to consider a citizen task force to help with this problem because she doesn't have it in her to pick up another dead feral or pet cat.

8. John Conyers, 5610 Monica Drive

Mr. Conyers stated that this is a country-wide problem and killing them doesn't help because they repopulate. He stated that everyone needs to protect themselves and others but should not hurt the coyotes unless they are not afraid of humans.

9. Chris, 8 Brians Lane

She stated that the coyotes shouldn't be killed, other than maybe the coys. She said the latest she has seen on social media is to poison them with poisoned hot dogs but that is a bad idea because a child or a pet will end up in the hospital or dead. She asked how anyone is supposed to know if the coyote was killed in self defense or not. She asked where the accountability was.

10. Carol, 4244 Waterfront Court

She stated that she let her dog out in January to go to the restroom at 10 PM and saw coyotes run through her yard after dropping her dog. She said her dog had 2 puncture wounds but thankfully recovered. She stated that it is the residents' responsibility to protect their pets.

11. Vice Mayor Tim Meyers

Vice Mayor Meyers stated that he wanted to see a balanced approach in the management plan. He commended the residents for their calm, democratic dialogue regarding this issue. He said that there are process questions that need to be answered and the Citizen Task Force should be explored. He also stated that there are several public safety concerns to be aware of regarding pets and the use of firearms or poison. He asked if the Council thought the ordinance on the agenda should be tabled for further discussion.

12. Councilmember Dale Paullus

Councilmember Paullus stated that he felt the ordinance should move forward because it gives the residents something actionable right now, but that the plan can still be amended and worked on even after the ordinance is voted on. He stated that he would be out of town on City business for the next meeting, but he would like to see the ordinance put forward for third reading and a vote in his absence.

13. Councilmember Terry Senger

Councilmember Senger stated that residents definitely need to watch their pets and that he doesn't necessarily believe that killing a coyote brings 3-4 more in its place. He does think that something needs to be done to mitigate the den on the Buher property.

14. Councilmember Adam Kraft

Councilmember Kraft commended the group for their dialogue. He said that he feels it is important to teach hazing strategies to residents and students, to make sure they are safe at their

bus stops. He said that he thinks the plan needs more review and detail, but that it is on the right track.

15. City Manager Scott Timmer

Mr. Timmer explained that the purpose of the plan is to put forth the best practices to manage coyote interactions and issues. He stated that it is a working document separate from the ordinance that can be revised and amended as needed.

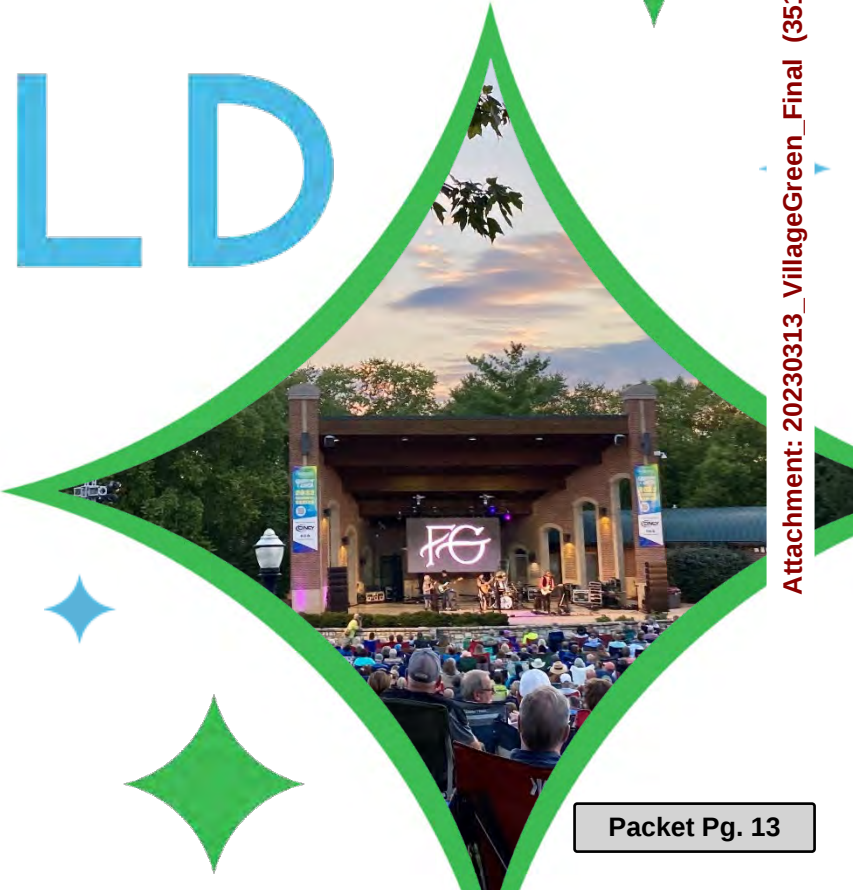

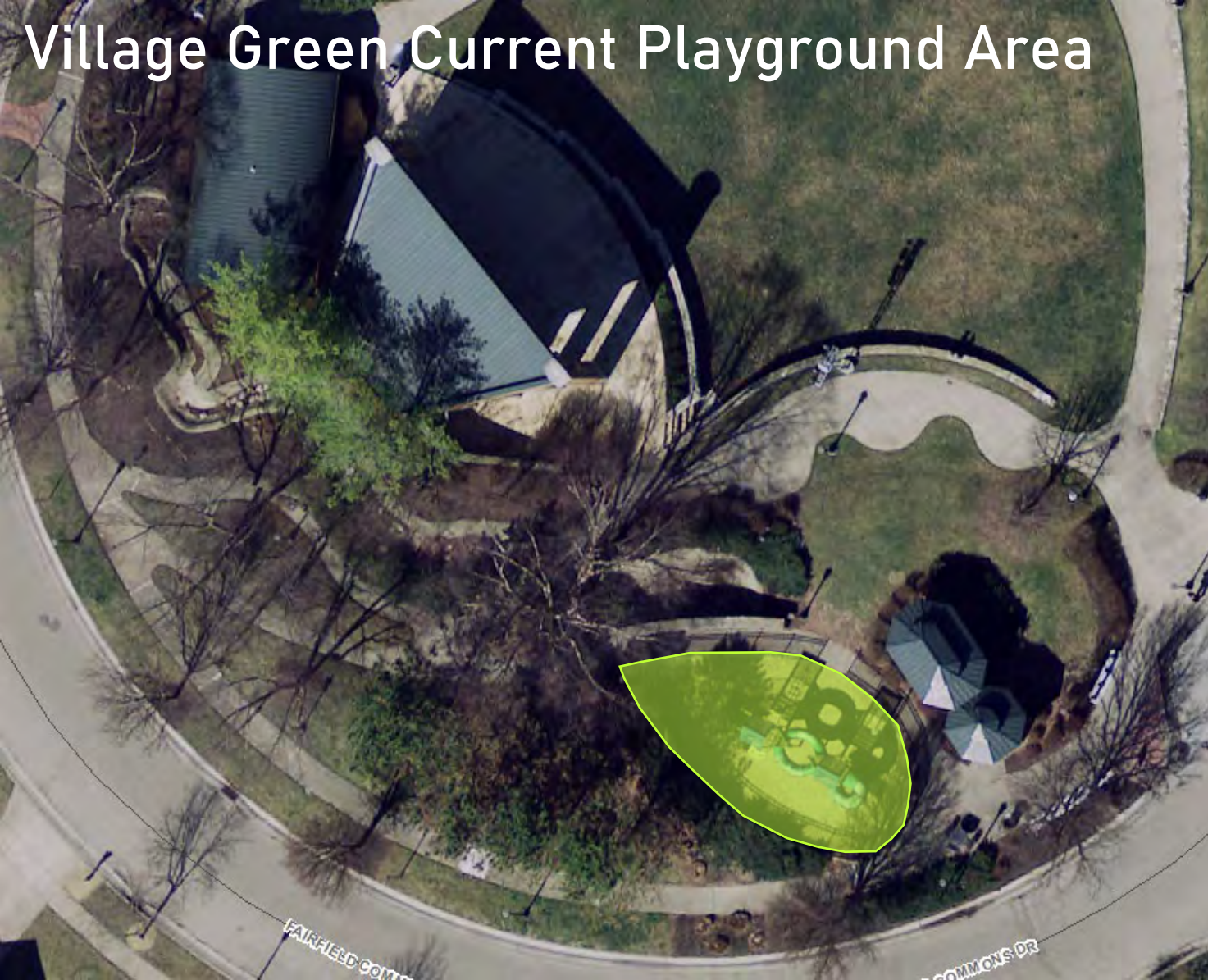

Village Green Current Playground Area



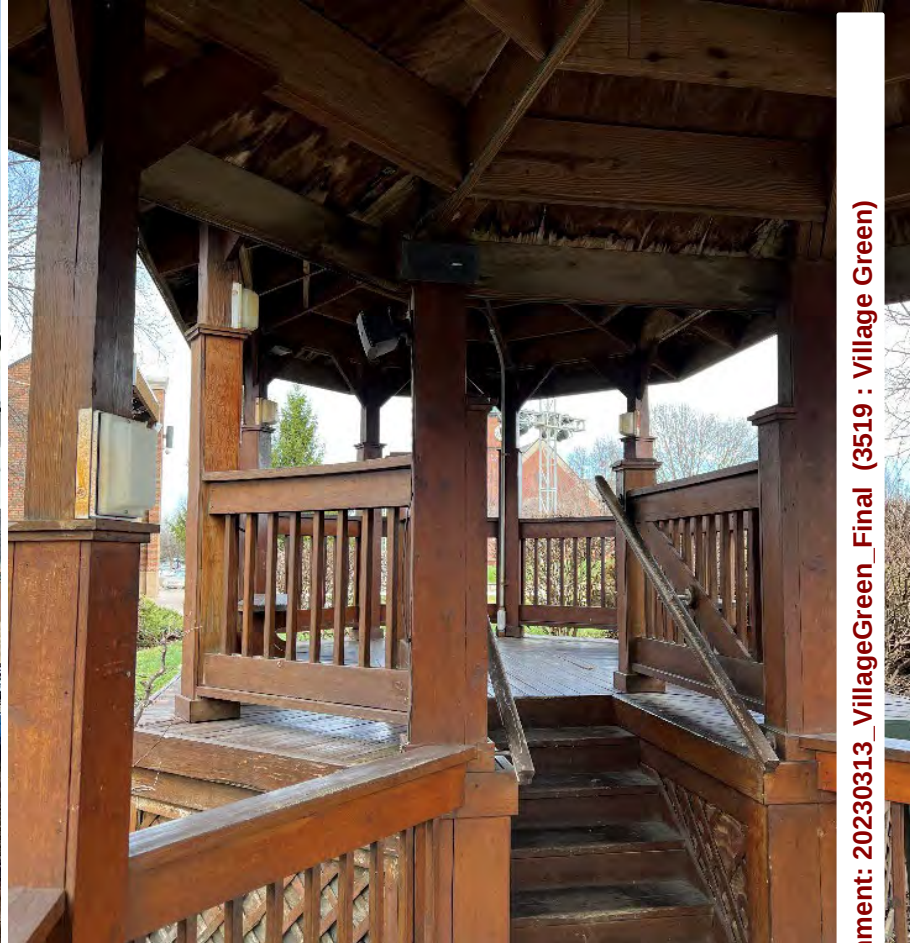
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Current Playground Area – Continued



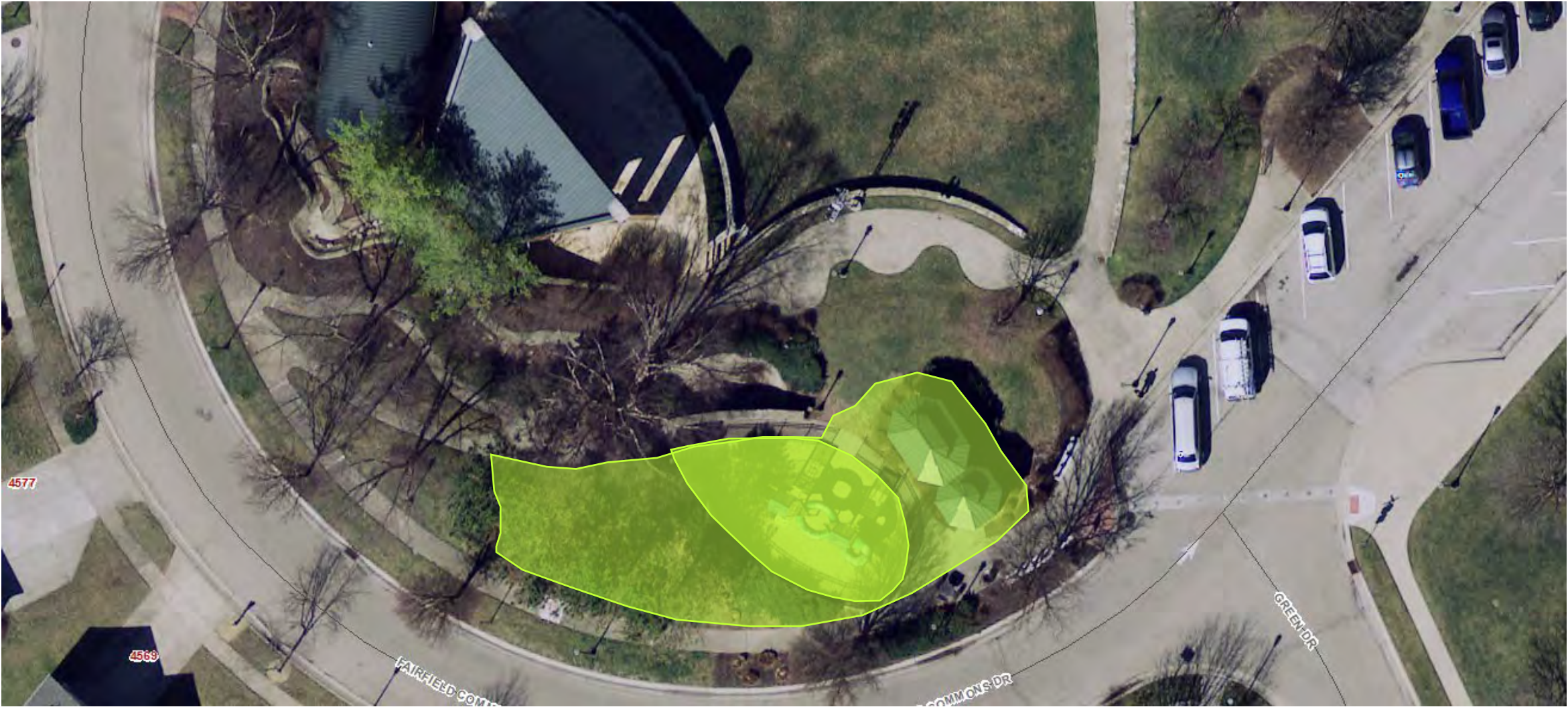

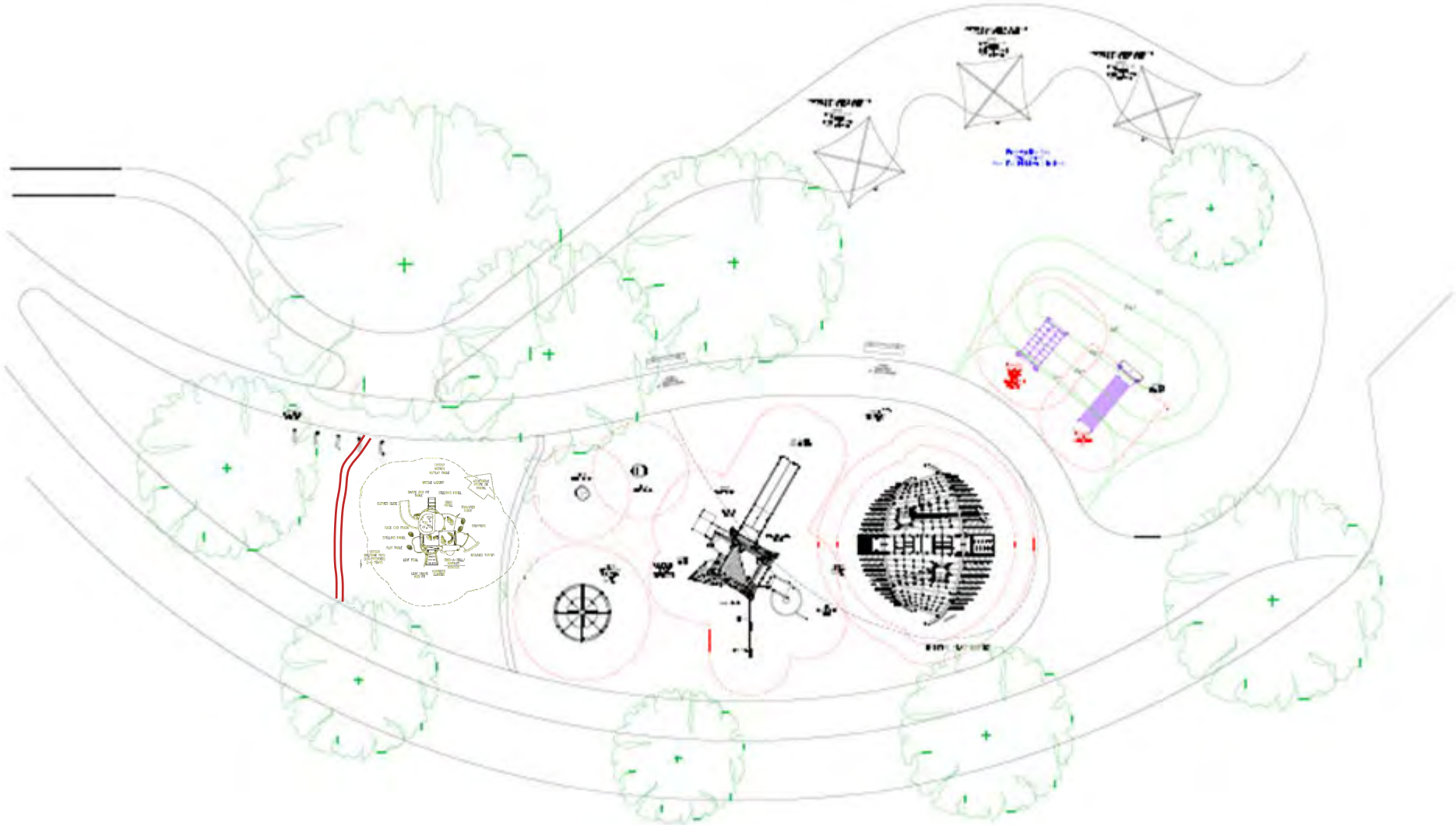
